

## **Guitar Technique**

The tuning you have been using is the most common guitar tuning.
Other tunings will obviously change where the notes are on the strings and how chords are fingered.
D tuning, for example, is sometimes used to give the key of D a more "open strings" sound. A variety of open tunings are very popular in several styles of guitar playing, for example

Hawaiian, steel guitar, and counatry blues.







Tablature indicates alternate tunings at the beginning of the first line.






## **Common Notation**

So far, you have only been practicing in the keys that are easiest for guitar. Singers and other instruments will often prefer other keys.

Practice playing pieces in other keys, and learn the main chords in each key.\*

A<sub>i</sub>major

F∄minor



Chords

G major

E minor

D major

**B** minor

Barre chords become very useful in keys that have many flats or sharps.

E major

C minor

Make barre chords by replacing the open strings of easy chords with a first finger barre.

B major

G∓minor

Or play fewer strings, adding fingers only on the necessary strings.

Or transpose to an easier key (see lesson 25) and use a capo.
